





LET'S DECIDE FOR SCHOOL FOOD Is it a Marginal Service?

If public food is viewed in narrow commercial terms then the service is undervalued.

OR

A Strategically Important Service

If it is re-valued for what it can achieve in terms of wider economic, social, health, educational and environmental value it becomes strategically important.
